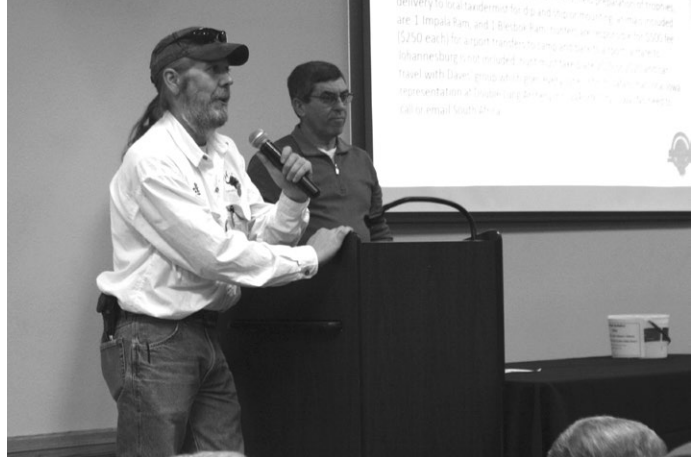

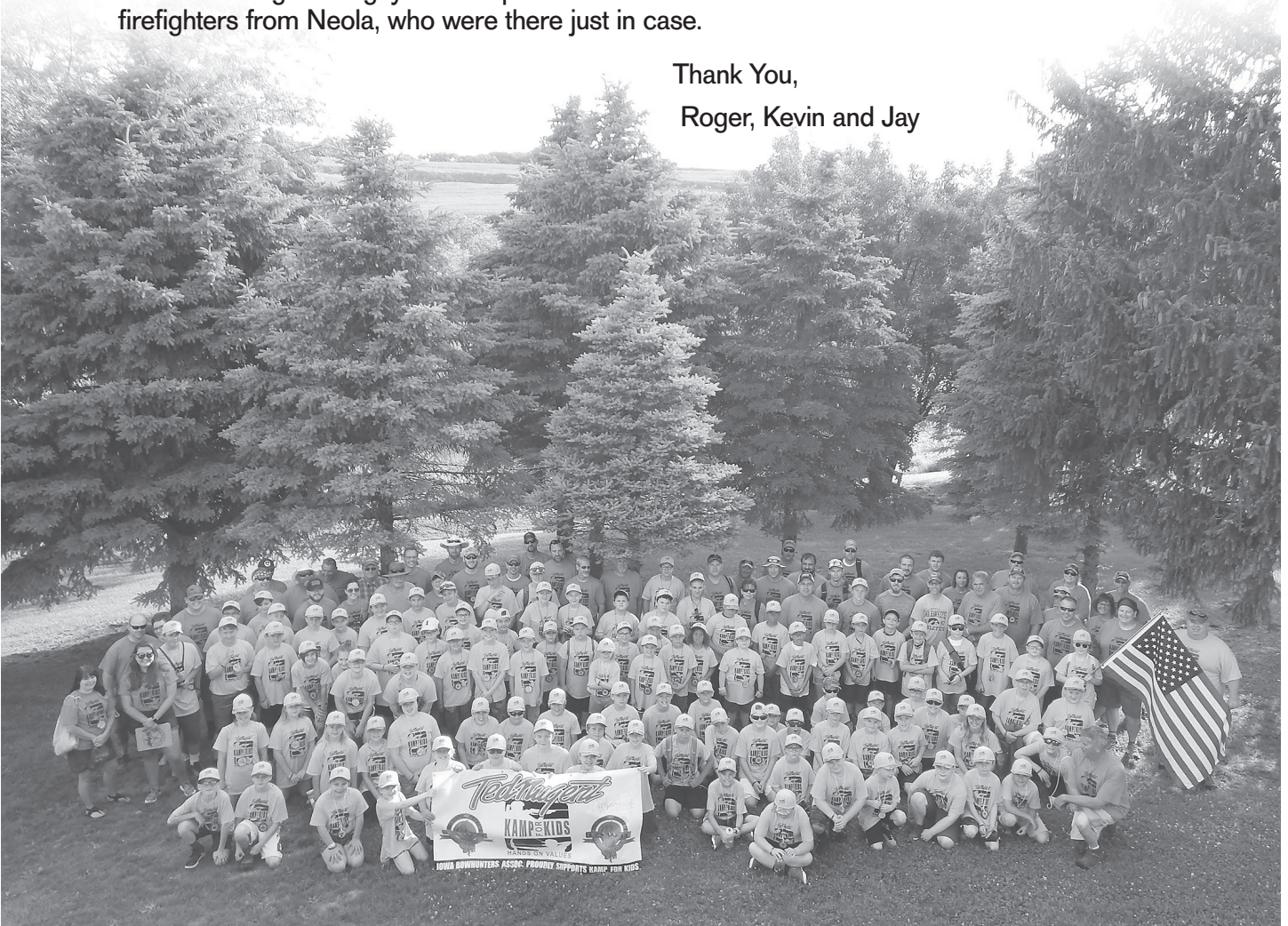


## TNKFK IOWA

## SPRING ISSUE

Where to start? Some days you come to work knowing what needs to be done and you roll up your sleeves and get to work. Other days you just try and do your job and deal with frustration all day. I'm going to start this article with a big "WHOOH." I look out my window finally watching the snow melt away and the weather begin to become normal again wondering will anything ever be normal again. So as I try and summarize the last three months at the DNR for you I realize this is a recap of a lot of frustrating days, but my optimistic side says they were really pretty normal. I want to touch on the two pressing matters that most bowhunters seem to be concerned about, the past deer season's harvest and CWD. In the DNR we humorously refer to February as meeting month. Seems that every meeting that can be scheduled happens this time of the year and many overlap. This is always a rush for the deer world as we are trying to summarize the season harvest, run models, make predications and go to more meetings. Add in a polar vortex and that creates a lot of cancellations and rescheduling. So with all that said the 2018-2019 deer season can be summed up as frustratingly normal. Why do I say frustrating? Think back over the last 3 months and recall the ebbs and flows that we encountered with weather. Seems like it was too hot during bow season and too much unharvested

corn, way too wet during gun one, normal for gun 2 and a little tipsy for late bow season. Put that all together and the reported harvest came in at 105,578 deer. This is two percent higher than last year. The archery harvest was down by 6% statewide while tag sales were only down 2%. First season shotgun, or as I refer to it as "mudfest 2018", saw a 9% drop in harvest compared to last year. However this was easily made up with a 17% increase in the second gun season numbers. Big picture message is we had a pretty good deer season. These numbers have been shared at all our regional staff meetings, public comment meetings and with the deer advisory tasks force. We are currently working with the information that we gathered at these meetings and developing recommendations for county antlerless quotas at this time.

The 2018 deer season saw another great year of collecting information about CWD in our state. I want to thank all our hunters for helping collect over 7,000 samples from across the state. Your help in providing these samples is paramount in allowing the DNR to monitor CWD status around the state. Your help also helps us keep costs down so that we can continue to do other good work for Iowa's wildlife resources. CWD was located in 4 counties this year. Dubuque County



was added to the list this year with its first positive deer which happened to be a roadkill. Additional samples were collected after the regular deer seasons and no additional positive animals were detected. We will be continuing to sample roadkill deer in this area throughout the spring. In the other three counties, Allamakee, Clayton. and Wayne 16 additional positive animals were detected. The CWD program is constantly evolving. We will do our best to keep you informed

of any changes that occur. For additional information please visit the Iowa DNR webpage.

### IBA Article June 10th, 2019

Several topics of interest have occurred over the last three months that will be of interest to Iowa bowhunters. I'll try to keep this short and sweet and remind members that they are always welcome to contact me to discuss any areas of concern they may have.

#### NEW ELSI UNVEILED

This last quarter has been the roll out of the new Electronic License System of Iowa (ELSI). This is an updated version of what you have been using for years only with some new twists. The Iowa DNR contracts our license sales through a 3rd party that must be bid upon. We have been working on this new contract for a couple of years and with feedback from our staff, license buyers and vendors feel that we are now offering you a better more user friendly way to purchase all your licenses. The new system is referred to as Go Outdoors Iowa and can be accessed through the DNR web page ([lowadnr.gov](http://lowadnr.gov)). Here you will be able to purchase your license, manage your DNR account and register your harvest. With any new system there is change and a learning curve involved. I would encourage you all to go out and open an account through the DNR web page, purchase a license if you want or just explore a little. By doing so now you may save yourself some frustration later this fall as you get ready to go hunting. We also encourage you to provide an email address that will allow us to send you updates that you request. The spring turkey season was our first live testing and provided us with some good feedback on how hunters were using the system. In general most people were pleased, although the biggest frustration came when trying to register their harvest. Those that did not have an account set up had to do so before they could register and we are afraid some people became frustrated and did not follow through with their obligation. Submitting this information is very helpful in allowing biologist to gauge annual variation and it is Iowa law so don't forgo this critical step.

Another feature of the Go Outdoors Iowa system is the "Hard Card" this is a durable stylish card that you can carry in your wallet that will have your purchased privileges on it. You can choose from two options (hunting or fishing theme) that will be mailed to you in about one week from purchase. This card option came about from public meetings and inputs during the development of the new contract. We thank all the people that provided feedback into creating this system.

If you are new to hunting or fishing you will appreciate the fact that you can click on the type of activity that you want to do and the system will populate your cart with what you need to pursue your game of choice. If you have already purchased something it won't double sell it to you again. We can also collect needed dove and duck surveys online

as you are purchasing licenses as well. So in short lots of new great ideas to make your life easier and help you Go Outdoors Iowa more.

#### 2018 BOWHUNTER SURVEY COMPLETE

Each year, the Iowa Department of Natural Resources (DNR) solicits responses from bowhunters as part of the Bowhunter Observation Survey conducted from 1 October to 2 December. The primary objectives of this survey are 1) to collect observations of white-tailed deer which serve as an independent index of regional deer populations across the state and supplement other deer data collected by the DNR, and 2) to collect observations of other select species to develop a long-term database of relative abundance used to monitor population trends of these species. The DNR selects survey participants each year using a two-stage, stratified-random sampling design in which a sample of 9,000 individual bowhunters are selected from the list of all hunters who purchased an archery hunting license in each of the preceding three years. Each participant receives a diary for recording the number of hours hunted during each hunting trip, as well as the number of deer, wild turkey, and select furbearer species seen during each trip. Reminder postcards are sent to all non-respondents by November 15 each year, and respondents are asked to return all surveys by December 2. Observations for 12 species are standardized by 1,000 hours hunted, and the mean number of observations per 1,000 hours hunted are estimated statewide and by survey region. In 2018, we collected responses from 2,098 bowhunters consisting of 20,907 hunting trips and 67,202 hours of total observation time ( $3.21 \pm 0.029$  hours/trip). The total number of deer observations increased between 2017 and 2018 in all nine survey regions, and the 10-year trend is increasing in seven of nine survey regions. Wild turkey observations increased in northwest, northeast, west-central, and south-central Iowa between 2017 and 2018 but decreased in all other regions. According to 10-year trends, bobcat and opossum observations are increasing while raccoon and red fox observations are decreasing statewide. Data from this survey are extremely valuable in monitoring population trends for harvested species such as white-tailed deer and raccoon and serve as the only index for monitoring population trends for uncommon species such as gray fox. #### ANNUAL TURKEY BROOD SURVEY

The annual production survey of wild turkeys in Iowa will start July 1st and run through August 31st. Any turkeys observed can be reported through an online survey system located on the DNR web page under the hunting/

turkey tab. This survey has been conducted for many years and is the primary way of determining annual productivity of wild turkeys across the state. Avid turkey hunters will receive a mailed postcard to conduct the survey, but any Iowan can report online. Our goal is to receive enough samples from all nine regions of the State to allow us to evaluate the productivity in that region as well as statewide. 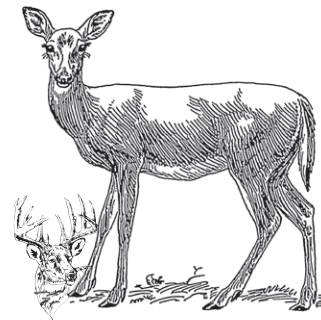
## ASK THE DNR

In the three years I have been submitting DNR news to the IBA newsletter I have never received a question until this quarter! I thank you for the question and hope I give you a thorough short answer.

**The question submitted is:** From a person over 70 years old. Why can't I get a crossbow landowner deer tag by itself; and not have to use a handicap excuse?

Answer: Not the softball biology question I was hoping for. This can be complicated and could get a little long winded so I'll do my best to be concise. Iowa only has one crossbow season. It is mandated by the legislators in the Code of Iowa (483A.8B) and is available to Iowa residents over the age of

70 for statewide paid antlerless license only. Something in Iowa Code is not up for debate through the Natural Resource Commission (NRC). It is the law of Iowa and will be enforced as written. That being said the Natural Resource Commission can look at methods of take during different seasons. This becomes very complicated as we move away from the traditional gun and bow weapons. There are more types of weapons and groups of people that want to be able to use new developing technologies every year. Hunters are often the most vocal against some of these weapon choices and timings, however the NRC must look at all users groups and the overall long term management of the species when making these decisions. We recognize that life and circumstances change, this is one reason we are constantly seeking input during public comment periods to help us guide future decisions. There is one option for a crossbow landowner tag right now. You can use a crossbow during the late muzzleloader season. If you want to use your crossbow during the bow season then you are restricted to purchasing a statewide antlerless only license.



## DNR message of what the public can do about CWD

- ✓ Provide a sample from hunter-harvested deer ✓ Attend public meetings to be informed on CWD
- ✓ Refrain from putting out mineral/salt and feed piles
- ✓ Refrain from moving deer carcasses from Iowa's known CWD endemic areas to other parts of the state, this helps ensure that hunters do not spread the disease to new areas
- ✓ Remove excess deer to lower deer densities ✓ Report sick looking deer anywhere in Iowa
- ✓ Report roadkills in CWD-positive zones or in counties of high sampling quotas
- ✓ KEEP HUNTING, while testing deer in CWD-positive areas and refraining from consumption of any positive samples

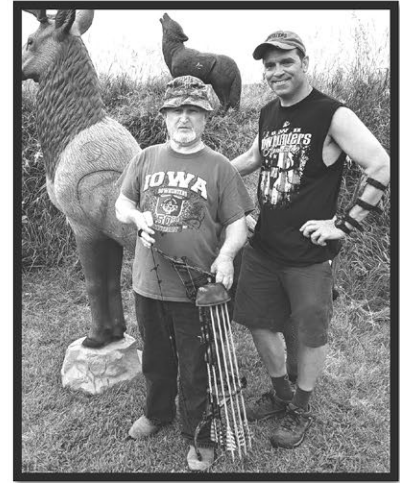
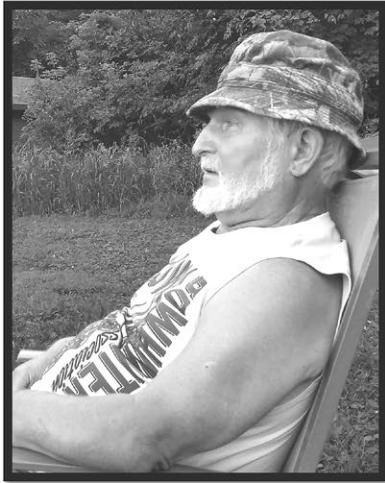


# Cal Struchen

June 2, 1941 - November 15, 2018

## 2021/2022 Iowa Games 3D Shoot Application

Entries must be postmarked by August 1, 2020. The Board of Directors will choose one club from the applicants as host. This is an annual shoot, with applications taken every two years. The application process is done early to ensure your club has a chance to attend the existing shoot for instructions on how it's done and maybe incorporate improvements. Send application to current IBA President.

1. Must be a 100% club.
2. Must be able to host shoot for two consecutive years.
3. Must be a two day shoot.
4. Able to handle 200-400 shooters (parking, restrooms, food, etc.).
5. Can be held on any of the 2nd, 3rd, or 4th weekends in July.
6. May be a stand-alone shoot or can be piggybacked with clubs' regular shoot.
7. If the Iowa Games shoot is hosted in conjunction with a club shoot, a shooter may shoot either Iowa Games shoot only, Club shoot only, or register for both shoots but must pay both registration fees and shoot twice.
8. Advertising and awards for the Iowa Games shoot are handled by the Iowa Games organization.
9. Advertising for host clubs' shoot needs to be done by host club.

10. Host club receives \$10 for each Iowa Games shooter.
11. Each Iowa Games shooter receives an Iowa Games T-shirt.
12. Host club provides two people for Iowa Games registration table.
13. Host club provides all targets.
14. Must be willing to attend Iowa Games meetings prior to the shoot.
15. Must attend club where shoot is currently held to familiarize new club with organization and operation.
16. Must pass on these guidelines to club that will host shoot the following year.

## By The Numbers



### Tree Stand Safety Initiative

I have never left the house expecting to have an accident – no one does. And yet I've had several bad ones, and quite a few minor ones. With all of those accidents I've been lucky; some have involved trips to the emergency room but outside of a few stitches, one broken bone, and a lot of sprains, strains, and bruises, I haven't had any major injuries.

I've never fallen from a tree stand, and I don't intend to, because every time I get off the ground, I do everything I can to protect myself. If I ever do have a tree stand accident, my injuries should be greatly minimized because of the easy-to-follow safety procedures I use.

Whitetails Unlimited has made tree stand safety a major initiative, because that is where the most injuries occur while deer hunting. And the simple fact is, most of these hunting accidents are preventable – and even when they can't be prevented, properly used safety equipment will minimize injuries. Just like wearing a seat belt every time you're in your car, hunters need to use safety harnesses and lifelines every time they're off the ground.

Many other people, companies, and organizations also promote tree stand safety, in a number of different ways.

The Tree Stand Safety Awareness Foundation is at the forefront of this effort, and information compiled by Dr. Glen Mayhew, the TSSA president, paints the picture through some very interesting numbers.

Mayhew, an associate dean at a health sciences university, is applying solid data collection and statistical methodology to the problem of tree stand accidents, and his research is showing that many assumptions hunters have are somewhere between wrong and very wrong, including many of the assumptions I had.

### Speed

One of the most striking numbers is not based on looking at the accidents themselves, but rather on high school physics. He has simply calculated the impact speed of a 180-pound hunter falling from various heights. Falling from a 12-foot height takes about 8/10th of a second and results in an impact speed of 18.4 mph. A 30-foot fall takes just under 1.4 seconds, and the hunter will hit at 30 mph. Most elevated stands are between these heights, and I have no desire to be smacked by anything at 20-30 mph. However, a properly fitted and attached harness/lifeline system can result in a fall of one foot or less, with no impact on the ground.

### Hunting Method

I have assumed that most accidents involve archery hunters, because most of my archery friends use tree stands, while fewer gun hunters in my world go aloft. However, when Mayhew evaluated 339 accidents, the numbers proved to be just about even between firearms and archery. While 44% of accidents were from hunters using bows and 5% using crossbows (49% total for archery), 39%

of injured hunters were using rifles or shotguns, and 12% had a muzzleloader with them (51% total for all firearms).

### Hunter Age

My assumption was that younger and/or older hunters would make up the majority of accident victims – younger hunters because they have less experience, and older because of issues with health, balance, strength, or falling asleep in the stand. Wrong again! Based on a sample size of 652 incidents, hunters aged 8-17 were only 3% of the total, and hunters 71 and over were just 6% of those injured. Hunters aged 35-54 approached half (42%) of those injured. Hunters aged 55-70 were the next biggest group with 28%, followed by those 18-34 with 22% of the total. (Adding those totals comes up to 101% because of rounding.) This results in an average age of the victims at 47 years old.

### Falls By Stand Type

I have a heck of a time with climbing stands – I've never been comfortable with them, so I assumed that these would be the most problematic for everyone. Not really. Mayhew's evaluation of 600 accidents showed that climbing stands were involved in 25% (second most common), and hang-on stands were at the top with 31%. Ladder stands were involved in 20% of the accidents, and homemade stands also racked up 20% of the incidents.

### When The Falls Happen

I thought I actually predicted this one correctly, but a closer look at the numbers showed that I was wrong again. I assumed

most falls happen while sitting in the stand, and in fact Mayhew's analysis of 593 falls showed that only 40% of the falls happened while on the stand. This was the single largest number of the four places that falls can occur, but it does not tell the entire story. The data categorized the falls as occurring at four different times: climbing up, climbing down, transitioning between the climb and the stand, and while being in the stand. While 40% of the falls were from the stand itself (where the hunter will spend most of the time), a full 60% of accidents occurred during the climb up (23%), climb down (22%) or transition (15%).

Realizing that the time spent on the ladder or climbing sticks is much, much shorter than the time sitting on the stand, the degree of danger while going up and down is much higher than while in the stand itself. I know a lot of hunters who are religious about being attached while in the stand, but can rationalize being disconnected while going up and down. The simple realization is that we are not howler monkeys, and we need to protect ourselves all the time, every time we are off the ground.

## Proper Equipment

Well, I finally got one right! I assumed that most people injured did not use a full-body harness and lifeline. In fact, looking at 94 injuries and 6 fatalities, 86% were not using a harness, and

the other 14% had a harness with them, but it was not connected, they took it off, or were using it improperly.

## Injuries vs. Fatalities

I really had no clue on the ratio between injuries and fatalities, but out of 694 accidents, Mayhew found that for about every 11 injuries, there was one fatality. A closer look at the data revealed the following information:

### Injuries:

Average age: 46  
Average fall height: 16 feet  
85.2% had no harness

### Fatalities:

Average age: 57  
Average fall height: 19 feet  
90.2% had no harness

The difference between an injury and fatality may simply be how the hunter

landed, the severity of the injuries at that point, and how long it took to get the injured hunter to a medical facility. Age and fall height are not dramatically different, but the fact that between 85% and 90% of these hunters were not using a harness should scare any hunter who refuses to use proper safety equipment.

## Why Falls Happen

There are myriad reasons someone falls while using a tree stand, and off the cuff I assumed falling asleep, alcohol, and the tree stand failing would lead the list. Once again, I was off base, and there were many more reasons for falls than I had imagined. Alcohol was actually the least common reason, cited in only eight accidents out of the 578 examined by Mayhew. (It should go without saying that consuming alcohol should never happen while hunting!) Falling asleep was also a minor reason, with only 15 cases. The most common reason, with 159 cases, was a combination of "Grip/Balance/Misstep/Slip." An additional line was called "Human Error" with 66 accidents, coming in at third place. The second place reason was a strap breaking on the stand, with 91 cases. The top three reasons for an accident to happen accounted for 55% of the total.

### The total set of reasons:

Alcohol: 8  
Sleep: 15  
Miscellaneous: 17  
Medical: 17  
Chain/Cable Break: 25  
Limb Break: 26  
Bottom Fell: 27  
Stand Shift: 34  
Step/Ladder Failure: 45  
Stand Break: 48  
Human Error: 66  
Strap Break (Stand): 91  
Grip/Balance/Misstep/Slip: 159

While looking at the list, I'm struck by how many of these accidents seem to have been preventable. Granted, if you are in a tree stand and your body decides to have a heart attack or stroke at that exact time, there is little you can do about it (17 accidents were attributed to medical issues), but it looks like many poor decisions appear in that list.

It is possible for a weld to fail on a step in a new stand, or a new strap to fail, but it's

unlikely. Failing to thoroughly inspect your stand before the season, so you can find the rusty spot that may cause the step to fail, a worn strap, or broken fastener, is a much more likely cause. Being excited to get out hunting, only to find your climbing sticks slippery with dew, frost, or ice, and still climbing up without securing your safety line is also a situation that can lead to disaster. I've seen guys pull stands from the garage, where they have been stored since the end of last season, load them up, and head out without inspecting them. It's easy to overlook some very basic things that can keep you safe, and you have to make a conscious decision to do things the right way.

## Conclusion

Tree stand safety is a personal decision, and all the information in the world cannot make someone safe if they do not put that information into action. However, the actions are fairly simple: inspect and maintain your gear, select safe locations, follow safe practices, be careful, and properly use a full-body safety harness and safety line every time you leave the ground, for the entire time you are off the ground.

The TSSA also promotes the "ABC" Building Blocks of Tree Stand Safety:

A: Always remove and inspect all your equipment before using.  
B: Buckle your harness securely.  
C: Connect before your feet leave the ground.

The collected data show that 99% of those who were injured in a fall from a tree stand were not properly wearing a full-body harness. If you are going to hunt from an elevated stand, you owe it to yourself and those who love you to do it safely. If you know someone who uses a tree stand, insist that they properly use safety gear every time they leave the ground. Good gear is not expensive, and whatever it costs it will be much less than a single trip to the emergency room! Research like that conducted by Dr. Mayhew helps define the problems and may suggest possible solutions involved with tree stand safety. However, the best, and easiest, solution rests with all of us to make the decision to do whatever is necessary to keep ourselves safe.

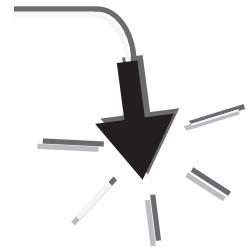

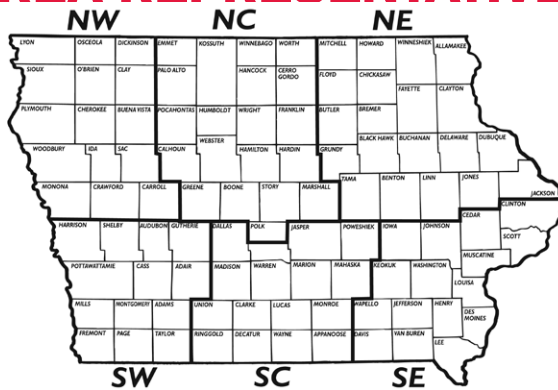
